
### 1. A cakewalk: - An easy task /achievement


Eg:- To switch the TV on, press the button, and bob's your uncle.

Aman Sir English


Eg:- He found himself in hot water over his comments about immigration.

Eg:- Seeing your crush coming can quicken your pulse.


### 22. Latin and greek: Incomprehensible

### 28. an olive branch: gesture of peace



39. heart in the right place: Someone is good even




if they sometimes behave in a wrong manner Aman Sir English

### 46. Lose your marbles :- To go insane



Eg:- The high school is just a stone's throw from his house.




# 48. Take with a grain of salt: Doubt the truth or value of something

# 50. Run around in circles:- to keep doing something without achieving much.



Eg- The company is growing by leaps and bounds this year.


52. Red tape: Official rules and bureaucracy that make it difficult to do something

Eg - This is good to have the agreement in black and white.


54. Catch 22 situation :- difficult situation in which the solution to a problem is impossible
